## IN THE SCHOOL'S GOOD BOOKS...

pring is definitely in the air at Husbands Bosworth School following their recent Ofsted inspection. Graded assessments are no longer given, but the inspectors noted that the school has maintained the high standards identified at the previous inspection, when the grading was 'good'.

The Ofsted inspection team visited the school in January and looked into various aspects of school life - from how the curriculum is built and delivered, to how well supported the children feel academically and emotionally.

#### The report highlighted the following key points:

- •Pupils, staff and parents and carers all agree that this is a small school with a big family feel
- •Pupils are inclusive and eager to support one another
- •Pupils behave well and are helped to understand their feelings and emotions
- •Content is taught in a logical order and builds cumulatively over time
- •Early reading is taught well and pupils go on to become fluent readers
- •Support for pupils' wider development is a strength

At the inspection the school roll is noted as 98.

#### TRAVEL PLANS

7 ou will no doubt have heard that our beloved Centrebus 58 service, Market Harborough to Lutterworth, has not only been saved but has been enhanced to allow for additional evening journeys and an extra stop at Market Harborough Train Station. For some probably obscure reason, the service will be renamed LC10 although, mysteriously, it will still be operated by Centrebus...

The new service runs the same timetable as previously during the day, but two later return journeys will improve the lot of those who were previously stuck for transport that fitted in with normal working hours. Hopefully this will encourage more use of the service, which will add to any future arguments that may threaten it or the way it operates.

We are reminded that the county council's subsidised bus services are in constant review and they will obviously not hesitate to cut marginal routes. So, again, use it or lose it still applies... Remember that the government-sponsored £3 single journey fare continues.

### POLICE FILE



To contact your Dedicated Neighbourhood Team (DNT) online, use the quick and simple online contact tool - Search Lutterworth Police. You will be asked a few questions to make sure your query gets to the right place.

Leicestershire Police Road Safety Team are trialing a new approach to road safety with two new 'state-of-the-art' Trucam II speed cameras, which combine a speed-detecting laser with a video recording function, can capture the information needed to prosecute

offenders without them having to be stopped. The cameras, which are road-side stationed can detect speeds, but can also be used to capture evidence of traffic offences such as not wearing seat belts and illegal mobile phone usage. They also record moving footage and provide a high-definition image which can be processed without the need to stop the



vehicles at the scene and will be helpful in tackling illegal car-meets and street racing incidents.

The cameras cost about £9,000 each and were paid for by Section 106 contributions from developers, as part of local planning approvals.

The Road Safety Team were in Husbands Bosworth recently, testing the new technology on High Street.

## **BOSWORTH IN FOCUS**

#### WILD ABOUT BOSWORTH

On a recent walk down the quarry lane, we caught sight of a pair of red kites wheeling extravagantly overhead in the blue sky and mewing, presumably in an elaborate courtship display. To be honest it's not a surprise to see red kites locally. They've been around here for a few years now and seem to be well established in the area, largely displacing the few buzzards that stalked the area previously. Slightly larger than the buzzard, the kite has a more leisurely, effortless gliding flight, where the the long forked tail is very evident. Their distinctive brick-red body plumage contrasts with white and dark brown in the wings.

No, it's not a surprise to see them... the surprise is that we're not surprised to see them! Thirty years ago red kites were only seen in a few small pockets in Wales, having been persecuted almost to extinction. My 1959 *Observer's Book of British Birds* doesn't mention them at all and the 1991 *RSPB Book of Birds* has no picture and only graces them with a brief '...limited to a small number of breeding pairs in mid-Wales'.



Their comeback is the result of one of the UK's most successful wildlife reintroductions. In 1990, two native Welsh birds and a small number of Spanish birds were released in the Chiltern Hills on the Oxfordshire/Buckinghamshiire border. Over the next four years more birds were released in the area and releases in other parts of the country followed.

The birds that we see are probably the result of the release of birds in Wakerley Woods, near Corby in Northamptonshire in 1995. The enlargement of their range seems to confirm a spread westwards from the Wakerley focus in the east, rather than from the Chilterns to the south; first appearing in the east of Harborough district and now seen across the whole of south Lecestershire. Today there are estimated to be 1,800 breeding pairs in the UK.

Inside the hut, Cubs have thoroughly enjoyed making noodles and taste testing them, a close win between BBQ and chicken flavours. Cubs were also able to visit Lutterworth Leisure Centre for a kayaking session, which was a fun challenge with lots of the young people having their first time doing a water sport.

As the spring and summer terms progress, the Scout Troop will be tending to the hut, testing their D.I.Y skills out. If you see them whilst visiting the park, please give them a wave and word of encouragement.

#### **BYGONE BOSWORTH**

Images from the Historical Society's Archive Collection

Certainly, the men in the group in the photograph would have been familiar with them and their content. The artefacts relate to Home Guard training and procedure and are remarkable survivors from the time.




Particularly interesting is this simple HG sign that would have been displayed in a vehicle windscreen whilst on Home Guard duties. One can imagine the urge to tear up and throw away these reminders of fraught times once they were no longer needed...

Initially set up as the Local Defence Volunteers

(LDV), the Home Guard was an unpaid armed citizen militia supporting



during World War II. Operational from 1940 to 1944, the Home Guard comprised more than 1.5 million

#### ALL SAINTS CHURCH NEWS

#### Saved by the Cross

There is a very strange story in the book of the prophet Ezekiel in the Old Testament. It is a nightmare that God gives to the prophet, as a warning to share with the community.

In this nightmare, God sends destroying angels through the community to kill anyone who is living in a way that is sinful, selfish, and hurting others. It is a nightmare because the community is currently doing very badly. They have turned away from God. Their lives are full of selfishness and greed, and the poor are being crushed and oppressed. So, men and women, old and young, are all to be struck down by destroying angels. Horrific!

But the story has an odd wrinkle. Before sending out the angels, God commissions another angel to go throughout the community to identify everyone who is upset by all the wickedness in their community. These people are to be marked on their foreheads. Whenever the destroying angels see this mark, that person will be kept safe.

What is interesting is that in the Hebrew - the language in which this part of the Bible was first written - the word we translate 'mark' is actually 'tav'. 'Tav', the last letter of the Hebrew alphabet. The letter 'tav' originated as a sign of two crossed sticks that marked a certain, agreed place. So, if people were agreeing where to build a house, or where to put up a fence, they would mark the place with two crossed sticks, like when we still say, 'X marks the spot'. So, 'tav' came to symbolise an agreement. So, in Ezekiel's nightmare, the 'tav' put on people's foreheads was a sign that they agreed with God about all the horrible things going on in their community.

Six hundred years later, when Jesus died on the cross, Christians finally understood that the mark of the 'tav' was actually a secret code. It was to show us that it is the cross of Jesus that keeps us safe from the punishment our sins deserve. Jesus' death is what saves us.

Like the people in Ezekiel's nightmare, we are saved by the cross and putting a cross on your forehead became something we do in church at baptism, when the priest traces a cross with holy oil on the person's forehead - the spiritual mark or seal that shows that this person is now protected, forgiven of their sin, and that they now belong to Jesus because they carry his mark. The Ash Wednesday liturgical practice of tracing an ash cross on our foreheads is another instance of this. We go into the period of Lent marked by Christ's cross, the cross that saves.
